A regular meeting of the Seward County Board of Commissioners was convened in open and public session at 8:30 a.m. on March 3, 2026 in the Commissioner's room at the Seward County Courthouse. Notice of the meeting was posted on the Courthouse bulletin board, on the Commissioner's Room door, on the Seward County website: sewardcountyne.gov and published in the Seward County Independent. The agenda for all meetings is kept continually current and is available for public inspection at the County Clerk's Office during normal business hours. The agenda is held open until one business day prior to the meeting for appearance before the Board. The Board of Commissioners has the right to modify the agenda to include items of an emergency nature only at such public meeting.

The Seward County Board of Commissioners convened on March 3, 2026 at 8:30 a.m.

The Chairperson noted that the public meeting information is posted as required by law and available for public distribution if requested.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Jonathan Jank, Executive Director of Seward County Chamber & Development Partnership (SCCDP), updated the Commissioners on activities of the organization.

Emily Manning, representing the Extension Office, and Brandy Johnson, County Clerk, updated the Commissioners on activities of their departments. Jon Regnier, Highway Superintendent, introduced Tim Kallhoff as the new Weed Superintendent, and then updated the Commissioners on activities of his department.

Commissioner Reports:

Commissioner Pekarek reported he met with a representative from a local well drilling business to have a conversation about water conservation, met with Commissioner Hain and the Seward School Superintendent regarding Public Transit, and followed up with Seward Foundation and plans to meet with representatives from the Legacy Fund in regard to transit funding.

Commissioner Schmieding reported that the Problem Solving Court Graduation will be held March 9th in York. He will attend a 4th of July Committee meeting, a Blue Valley Community Action (BVCA) meeting, and a Visitors Bureau meeting, and reported that the Ag Banquet will be held March 23rd. He also noted that he received several phone calls in regard to Public Transit.

Commissioner Ahmic reported she had conversations with people as a result of the Planning Commission meeting, and scheduled some people to speak at the next meeting, worked on Public Transit items, such as data collection specific to budgeting,

met with Commissioner Zabrocki and the Public Transit Director, attended a Zoom meeting with the City of Milford and other representatives specific to flood plain management, followed up with the Planning Commission Ag Regulation subcommittee, and sent emails to officials and department heads that she is liaison to, requesting Monthly reports.

Commissioner Zabrocki reported he attended a SouthEast Nebraska Development District (SEND) executive board meeting, attended a Nebraska Intergovernmental Risk Management Assn. (NIRMA) Claims Committee meeting, and met with Commissioner Ahmic and the Public Transit Director.

Commissioner Hain reported that she was notified by the Aging Services Director that there is a vacancy on the Aging Advisory Board, attended a Zoom meeting with Congressman Flood's staff regarding Community Project Funding, worked with the Road Dept Administrative Assistant & Commissioner Schmieding on the application for Community Project Funding Grant for the 420th Road paving project, met with the Seward School Superintendent and Transportation Director, along with Commissioner Pekarek regarding transit services for school aged students, and sent out the monthly update request to all department heads and officials she is liaison to.

Ahmic presented a letter of support for the 420th Road Paving Project to be submitted to Congressman Flood's office requesting Community Project Funding.

During the Public Transit update, Ahmic noted that at the February 3rd meeting, the Board proposed a reduction in service hours which required scheduling a public hearing. However, after meeting with the Public Transit Director on February 5th, it was determined that a reduction in service hours was not necessary. She stated that this updated information was not clearly communicated to individuals who had previously been contacted about a possible change. After reviewing the budget, Ahmic stated that there will not be a deficit at the end of the fiscal year, as had previously been reported by the Public Transit Director. Hain stated that before bringing forward potential significant changes to address budget concerns, she strongly encourages all appointed and elected officials to conduct thorough reviews of their budgets. If assistance is needed, she encouraged them to seek help early, rather than allowing issues to escalate. Hain added that the situation resulted in significant community backlash, which was unfortunate, as the Commissioners were acting on information provided to them. Ahmic reiterated that no changes have been made to service hours, and none are anticipated. She also noted that the public hearing process remains important, as the Board values public input.

Upon review of all necessary facts, the County Commissioners make the following findings:

1. Y The use, in all other respects, conforms to the applicable regulations of the district in which it is located.
2. Y The use will have adequate water and sewer facilities.
3. Y The use will be in harmony with the character of the area and the most appropriate use of the land.
4. Y The establishment, maintenance, or operation of the conditional use will not be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety, moral, comfort, or general welfare of the county.
5. Y The conditional use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purpose already permitted, nor substantially diminish and impair property values within the neighborhood.

6. Y The establishment of conditional use will not impede the normal and orderly development of the surrounding property for uses permitted in the district.
7. Y Adequate utilities, access roads, and drainage facilities have been or are being provided.
8. Y That adequate measures have been or will be taken to provide ingress and egress so designed as to minimize traffic congestion in the public streets.
9. Y The use does not include noise, which is objectionable due to volume, frequency, or beat unless muffled or otherwise controlled
10. Y The use does not involve any pollution of the air by fly-ash, dust, vapors, or other substance which is harmful to health, animals, vegetation, or other property or which can cause soiling, discomfort, or irritation.
11. Y The use does not involve any malodorous gas or matter, which is discernible on any adjoining lot or property.
12. Y The use does not involve any direct or reflected glare, which is visible from any adjoining property or from any public street, road, or highway.
13. Y The use does not involve any activity substantially increasing the movement of traffic on public streets unless procedures are instituted to limit traffic hazards and congestion.
14. Y The use does not involve any activity substantially increasing the burden on any public utilities or facilities unless provisions are made for any necessary adjustments.

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat 39-2115 through 39-2119 require annual development and filing with the Nebraska Board of Public Roads Classifications and Standards (NBCS) a One- and Six-Year Plan of highway, road, and street improvements based on a priority of needs and

calculated to contribute to the orderly development of an integrated statewide system of highway, roads, and streets.

WHEREAS, a One- and Six-Year Plan was prepared and proposed to the governing body.

WHEREAS, an advanced notice was published in the local newspaper, stating that a public hearing would be held on the proposed One- and Six-Year Plan in the County Commissioner's Room in the Seward County Courthouse, Seward, Nebraska, on Tuesday, February 24th, 2026, at 9:15 am.

WHEREAS, an advanced notice was posted at the following places where it was likely to attract attention: Seward Post Office, Seward County Courthouse, Seward City Hall, and the Seward Memorial Library.

WHEREAS, a public hearing was conducted on the proposed One- and Six-Year Plan, as stated in the advance notices, on Tuesday, February 24th, 2026, at 9:15am.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioner's of Seward County, Nebraska, that the aforementioned approved One- and Six-Year Plan is hereby adopted for submittal to the Nebraska Board of Public Roads Classifications and Standards (NBCS).

Regnier and Trebilcock discussed the Perma-Zyme Soil Stabilizer test spots and soil sample results. Regnier reported that his department sent samples from different locations throughout the county, as well as from their stockpiles, to be tested to determine if they were good candidates for the soil stabilizing product. The soils that were sampled were all found to qualify for this product. To purchase three miles worth of the product is projected to cost \$27,444, which includes the services of a Field Rep from the company. There was discussion about where to test the product throughout the county, as traffic patterns vary by location. Questions arose regarding the preparation needing to be done prior to the product testing and the equipment required to do both the preparation and the testing. Regnier reported that the Road Department will need something to haul water in bulk, as was previously discussed at the February 10th Commissioner meeting. He also stated that if this is going to be long term and done every year, they'll need to invest in a packer. Trebilcock reported that he found a trailer with all the necessary equipment for approximately \$22,334 total, noting that the trailer can be used for multiple things, not just Perma-Zyme application, and their department already has a truck to pull it.

Moved by Hain and seconded by Pekarek to approve the use of Perma-Zyme Soil Stabilizer, as was discussed, regarding test spots on the first mile going north on 420th Road north of Hwy 34, McKelvie Road between Hwy 34 and 196th Road, and 252nd Road south of Pioneers Road, and approve the funds for the purchase of a water trailer to be paid out of the Inheritance Fund, for a total amount of \$49,944.00.

The next item discussed was the Road Construction Crew Member Job Description. The purpose of this crew is to construct the roads, but there will still be a road crew of heavy equipment operators that is separate and will focus on maintaining the roads. The construction crew members will possess a particular skill set specific to operating heavy equipment and building roads. In the past, there were discussions about

potentially contracting with an outside company to perform this work or creating an internal crew to focus solely on this work. After comparing costs, it was decided that it would make more sense to have a team dedicated to building the roads. Zabrocki noted that this will be paid from the Inheritance Fund this year, but it is something that the Road Department will have to budget for next fiscal year.

The last discussion was in regard to the budget and yearly plan for the new Road Construction Crew. Regnier prepared a budget from April 1, 2026 to June 30, 2026, which is the remainder of the current fiscal year. The budget includes wages, benefits, and equipment. This would be paid out of the Inheritance Fund for the remainder of the fiscal year and budgeted, minus the equipment, out of the Road Fund in the future. Regnier also established a yearly plan for the new crew, with different projects to focus on each month. He noted that he will create a new plan every year.
